### **Retiree Assistance Program**

Our Machinists Union conducted the first Retiree Assistance Program class after spending over a year developing the structure from some strategy classes involving other Machinists Union Retirees.

The Retiree Assistance Program is not meant that those attending to take on all the burdens of others they may come into contact but be that resource person to help direct them for proper aid and or to make sure a retirees life is lived to its fullness.

Each lodge should be trying to set up a retiree club or at least have active retir-



ees on a class list to help. We want to make sure while you may retire from you job ... your Union wants to continue to help and assist. We want members to continue to me involved and not be afraid to ask for help.

We were a diverse group as with all of the Machinists Union Placid Harbor classes. Coming from all three coasts, the midwest and from Canada.

Here is a list of the topics with only an abbreviated explanation of what was taught:

- Household Safety: showed easy changes to household layout and how to properly get up if you fall and are alone.
- Community Resources: make sure member knows of resources within their healthplan; individually build a resource network; use of '211'.
- Addition: discussed not only the alcohol factor but the addition of prescription and non-prescription drugs.
- Volunteer Self-Care/Stress: we may be in a caregiver position and need to know how our helping out is affecting us.
- Financial Issues/Exploitation of the Elderly/Consumer Protection Scams:
- Listening: we need to *really* listen and observe to give out the correct information in our efforts to truly help.
- Financial Issues/Health Care: some of this is understanding before retirement what will be your income in retirement and make sure your health issues are covered and to prepare for some not covered by insurance.
- Volunteer Self-Care, Nutrition: we know that breakfast is the most important meal which determines our good and bad food intakes. We also received a pamphlet and the good and bad foods that convert to sugar and may increase diabetes.
- Grief Issues: how we can help others and what you may think is very appropriate, and widely used, may cause more harm.
- Confidentiality: learning to keep the information to ourselves so there is trust unless there are some real safety issues.
- Maintaining Physical Stength: as seniors were shown some simply but necessary exercises we need to do to keep good health and attitude.
- you are never too old to learn
  - Living Challenges: this may mean not falling into the trap how persons conceive seniors should live but we have many productive and fullfilling years to go!
  - Financial Issues/Investing: the before investing and then the after retirement need to make sure our savings do last.
  - Mental Health: the differences from dementia and the normal aging process and what we can do.

## Reimbursement of Lost Time for Committee Person

While you will be reimbursed for lost time it may not be as fast as you would like if proper procedure is not followed. Please be aware reimbursement will only be done as stated in the letter from District 10 to Financial Officers dated January 23, 2009.

This must happen or be on file at the Lodge office:

- W4 must be completed by you and on file at the LL66 office. This needs be done only once.
- Properly complete the Lodge 66 Reimbursement Form.
- Lost time must be approved by your business agent at District 10.

Since October 2006 all lost time is paid by ADP payroll. Payroll is done only twice a month. If you miss one payroll date then it will have to wait until the next. Lost time reimbursement forms must be into the LL66 office before the Monday of a payroll date.

# Honorary Withdrawal Card

#### There is a \$1.00 Fee - It Is Not Free

There has always been a fee for the withdrawal card. All too often a member sends in the application for the card and expects one at no cost.

Withdrawal cards are allowed if:

- Left the trade because of illness
- Obtained employment outside the trade or industry.
- Furthering education.
- Obtained a supervisory position above the rank of working foreman.
- Because of circumstances over which I have no control, am compelled, as a condition of employment, to join another labor organization.

In order to get the withdrawal card a member must obtain such within two months of paying dues.

# Two Social Security Bills Favorable for Seniors

The Alliance sent two letters to the Hill this week in support of Social Security Bills that would improve senior's lives. Sen. Tom Harkin's (D-IA) Strengthening Social Security Act of 2013, S567, is similar to Harkin's Rebuild America Act, but not identical. It extends the Social Security Trust Fund through 2049; lifts the cap on earnings subject to the Social Security tax over a 5 year period beginning in 2014 (the previous legislation removed it over 10 years); and immediately applies the CPI-E. the changes would increase average benefits by about \$65 per month, or \$800 per year. As before, those now contributing beyond the 2013 cap would get an increase in benefits, though that formula has changed.

### Machinists Union Retiree and Alliance Member Speaks Out

Alliance member Diane Fleming spoke out about the budget on March 13 at a Capitol Hill event with the House Progressive Caucus. The United Airlines retiree, who worked 39 years as a reservations agent and in ticket sales as a member of the International Association of Machinists, spelled out what the Ryan budget would mean for seniors.

"Moving to a voucher system for Medicare, as the Ryan plan outlines, is just a way of cutting Medicare. It shifts health care costs onto retirees, most of whom absolutely can not afford it and would not get the health care they need," said Ms. Fleming.

**Republican Ryan's proposals** besides cutting Social Security benefits, which reduces a seniors income, he would:

- Increase senior health care premiums, by voucherizing medicare that would cost seniors \$1,200 more per year by 2030 and as much as \$5,900 per year by 2050.
- Increase prescription drug costs by repealing the Affordable Health Care Act (Obamacare) which would once again open up the donut hole. Right now seniors get a 50% discount on brand name and 14% on generic.
- Cut Medicaid which is now the primary pay for long term care services for seniors.
