

This September at the Machinists Union Wisconsin State Council of Machinists Conference and at the Wisconsin AFL-CIO Convention the agenda was politics. While a few candidates gave speeches, the underlying message was political education. We are not talking about how the system works but on how and for whom the politicians work for. Knowledge of what a candidate is really saying and their stance on all the issues is critical to the voter. All to many times we are misled by the cries of sanctity and morality on wedge issues that are really personal choices and do not even belong in the hands of the government, while the real issues of jobs, health care, fair trade, education, corporate stealing of our pension money, social security, real homeland security and a laundry list of others are overlooked for the sake of the wedge issue. 

From Your President

Since taking office in August, I have been contacted by several members and asked to address their concerns. I'm sure that the issues brought to my attention are on the minds of many more members, so I will use this newsletter to get things "out in the open".

Members that work second and third shift are asking why the Lodge Christmas Party is held on a Friday evening. Unless they take time off from work, most are unable to attend. Members on third shift can attend, but I've worked third shift and know I would not want to go into work after having a good time with my Union brothers and sisters at a holiday party.

The Executive Board did attempt to address this issue earlier this year. The party has always been held at the Union hall and we decided that there was no reason we could not have it at the hall on a Saturday. It would be easier on those that take vacation time to shop for the food, cook, decorate and clean up the hall. For members that don't know, the party is organized and setup by the Executive Board, Brother Bruce Larson and his wife Sue, several retirees and their spouses. We were concerned about increased attendance, but thought we would give it a try.

In April and May, an additional 1200-1400 members were merged into Lodge 66. At that time we realized our hall would not be large enough and decided to have the party at another facility. We looked into several options. We contacted several businesses with banquet halls, the Milwaukee County Parks Department and a few American Legion posts. All had limitations on bringing in our own food and beverages. Some would have been costly to members and not fiscally responsible on the part of the Board.

We did reserve the hall at Paulo's Italian Restaurant on 51st and Howard, but because we wanted to provide the food, we had to have the hall on a Friday night. If we wanted Saturday, we were obligated to use their catering service, which would have been a big expense to the Lodge.

Some of our members from the Kenosha and Racine area requested that we have an additional party at the Kenosha Labor Hall for members living in that area. We will consider this request for next year if we have enough interest and volunteers to organize the event.

I have also received some comments on our Friday evening membership meetings. About six years ago, we did a mailing around the November elections and included a survey for members asking them what day of the week and what time of the day or evening they would like to have membership meetings. The mailing was sent to approximately 1800 members. I received 24 responses, most of which wanted the meeting day and time to remain the same. We have had 2400+ members since May and the attendance at our monthly meeting remains about the same as it was prior to the merger. Unless we see an increase in the involvement of our members, both new and long time, the Executive Board will find it hard to justify a change to the members that are involved. I was asked if we could have quarterly meetings for our members in Racine and Kenosha. Again, if there is interest of more than a few people, this is something we will consider for the future.

Our Board would appreciate comments and suggestions from merged members as to how their Local Lodge meetings were held in the past in regards to accommodating all three shifts, along with preferred dates and times. We would also like to hear from any members willing to volunteer to arrange a Christmas party for second and third shift workers next year if we cannot find a suitable facility for a Saturday. (Members should read the newsletter and visit our website for Union activities that will allow them to get involved in events and education opportunities schedule before or after their work hours.)

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2007 Scholarship Competition

of YOUR Machinists Union (IAM)

The scholarship competition is open each year to members of the IAM and their children. This yearly competition was developed in 1960 and all money is from a separate fund.

Awards to members are \$2,000 per academic year. They are granted for a specific period from one to four years to enable the member to earn a Bachelor's degree or a two year vocational/technical certification.

Awards to children of members are for college at \$1,000 per academic year. All awards are renewed each year until a Bachelor's degree is obtained or for a maximum of four years, whichever occurs first. Vocational/technical school is \$2,000 per year until certification is attained or for a maximum of two years, whichever occurs first.
