Along with the brats and hot dogs, we also had chips, juice and water ready to hand out to any and all of our union brothers and sisters that stopped by.

Once the parade got rolling we made our way through downtown Milwaukee beginning at Zeidler Square and ending at the Henry W. Maier Festival Grounds. It was a breath of fresh air seeing and hearing so many that welcomed us and chanted with us about the labor movement. Conductor/Sentinel and Educator Pepe Oulahan led us in chants again this year. Shouts of "What do we want? Union!!! When do we want it? Now!" and "Union! Power! Power Union" were chanted by those attending the parade along with the Lodge 66 members marching.

The parade destination was Laborfest at The Henry W. Maier Festival grounds. Once we arrived the sense of solidarity and union with all of the great unions from the Milwaukee area was overwhelming. Warm greetings, hugs of brotherhood and sisterhood were visible throughout the grounds. The entertainment, food and drink was plentiful at the festival grounds along with informational tables set up for a multitude of labor activities in the Milwaukee County area.

<u>Labor Day Celebrations Across</u> <u>Southeastern Wisconsin: Janesville</u>

There was a 2 day Labor Day Celebration in Janesville WI this year. There is no charge to go to the Labor Fest Activities. It Began Sunday at a new location on Festival Street in Janesville at the Janesville Town Square. The square has plenty of room to hold the festival as it was developed to hold events such as Labor Fest and other activities. The Festival was started in 1991 with support from Organized Labor and the Business Community along with many Volunteers. There are many things built into the Town Square to make it appealing to have events, there is a splash pad for family enjoyment and a pavilion for bands to play from. The city allows for the Festival Street to be closed down to vehicle traffic to hold the events, between 2 main streets that people enter the downtown area.

Sunday started with bands, kids games, a magician and face painting available for the children to enjoy. There were food vendors that made food available to attendees. The Labor Fest Committee along with many volunteers and supporters manned and sold beverages for young and old. The cost of activities at the event are kept as inexpensive as possible to make it affordable for all workers and families to enjoy Labor Fest.

Monday Labor Day starts off with assembling the Labor Day Parade. People bring their chairs and blankets to mark their favorite spots to watch the parade along the parade route early in the morning. The units start assembling at 10:00 A.M. There is a car display setup near the start of the parade route for people to observe several very nice cars and vehicles. National Anthem at the Start of the parade route. The route is about a mile long. The Janesville Police and Fire Department start the parade off followed by Rock County Sheriff's Department. There are floats, marchers, both of Janesville's High School Bands, specialty units, and stilt walkers.

<u>Labor Day Celebrations Across</u> <u>Southeastern Wisconsin: Kenosha</u>

Last year I drove up to Milwaukee to join our Local in the Labor Day festivities. Afterwards I thought to myself, "I wonder if we still have a Laborfest in Kenosha?" As a kid, I remember going to huge Labor Day celebrations; but back then we had quite a few more factories, including an AMC / Chrysler plant and several thousand more union workers. It turns out Kenosha still has one – just not as big - and our local lodge donates money to help support it. So I decided if our local is donating money to it then we should have a presence at it, plus many of our members live in the Kenosha area; so I coordinated with the Kenosha AFL-CIO council, who sponsors the event, to set up a table there.

My wife helped me load and unload my truck at the St. Therese Festival Grounds Labor Day morning and our union brothers Pat Bufton and Dan Kosterman spent the afternoon helping me hand out some IAM swag (pens, pencils, buttons, etc.) along with Ocean Spray Juice and Craisins. A last minute cancellation by the original band, led to Betsy Ade, from the Voice and her band, The Well-Know strangers filling in. That, along with the nice weather, brought in a record crowd.

The Kenosha AFL-CIO set up two free bounce houses for the kids, manned the beer truck, collected donations for the Shalom Center and raffled off prizes. The Carpenters Union had little projects for the kids to build and take home - in between songs you could hear them hammering away. The Kenosha teachers union also had various kids' activities going on. The Firefighters union had their annual chili cook off and for the first time in at least 13 years, they ran out of chili. The Police union handed out ice cream till they ran out. The VFW and the Democratic Party were grilling up brats, hotdogs and hamburgers till the end, when they ran out. And Our IAM table handed out most of our union swag and all 240 bottles of 10oz juice and 128 bags of Craisins.

There was no shortage of politicians attending including local area State Representatives, many of the city and county elected officials and U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin attended, spoke for a few minutes, congratulated our Labor Persons' of the Year winners and eventually made their way to our table for some free juice and IAM buttons. They were all glad to see the IAM represented at Kenosha Laborfest this year.

The Kenosha AFL-CIO ended up presenting the Shalom Center with 617 pounds of food and \$528 dollars they had collected. Good music, great food and nice weather made for a perfect day, as I saw several union brothers and sisters enjoying the event with their families. I plan on participating again next year and I hope to see you there or at one of the Labor Day events in your area.

IAM Free College Experience: Mike Oettel

Last month we rolled out a new series highlighting our members that are enrolled in the IAM Free College program. As we continue this series we sat down with Mike Oettel, Recording Secretary here at Lodge 66 to ask him how his experience with the IAM Free College program has been so far. Mike also works at Ocean Spray Cranberries as a machine operator, has served as Chief Steward and currently serves on the Negotiating Committee. He has completed 4 semesters of the IAM Free College program so far and has earned 13 credits. When asked why he enrolled in the IAM Free College program he responded "Because it was free. You can't go wrong with continuing education at the low, low cost of free. I also wanted to show my daughter how easy it was to fill out the FAFSA paperwork as well as enrolling in classes."

Mike's major is Business management with a focus on Labor relations. When asked if it has helped him in his current roles within the union he said "It has helped me, it has taught me about the struggles of other unions/companies and the struggles unions have had organizing. I've learned about the lengths the companies will go to stop an organizing drive." He went on to talk about his favorite course he has taken so far "It's been intro to labor Studies. I learned the most pertinent information regarding labor struggles and the laws that have been passed regarding labor."

We asked him how long it had been since his last educational experience, he replied "It's been 20 years. The transition isn't that bad and hasn't been as hard as I thought it would be. Online learning is much different than in person as it's self-directed, you're not attending class per se but scheduling when you can complete your assignments." He went on to add that "It takes a little bit of time but it's not a stressful time commitment. It's usually a couple hours per week per class."

At his current pace Mike said he will graduate in the fall of 2022 and he has saved about \$8,000 so far by taking advantage of the IAM Free College program. The credits he earns are the same accreditation as the UW system. When asked if he would recommend the IAM Free College program to other members he said "Yes I would! I believe everyone should enroll. If you are a dues paying member it is well worth the cost of free to enroll."

<u>Contact Your Congressman/</u> <u>Congresswoman on H.R. 3,</u> <u>Lower Drug Costs Now Act of</u> <u>2019</u>

On September 9, 2019 Rep. Frank Pallone Jr. (D-NJ) introduced H.R. 3 also named Lower Drug Costs Now Act of 2019. This legislation comes before a report from the Committee on Ways and Means report headlining the fact that Americans pay four times more for prescription drugs than eleven similar countries that the U.S. was compared to. Ways and Means Committee Chairman Richard E. Neal (D-MA) said the following regarding the report's findings: "We've long known that families across the country, including those in my home state, Massachusetts, pay far too much for their medicines. This report reveals just how unfairly high prescription drug prices are in the United States compared to prices in other, similar nations. Our findings underscore the need for Congress to pass H.R. 3, the Lower Drug Costs Now Act, newlyintroduced legislation that would allow the U.S. government to negotiate lower drug prices for American consumers based on international pricing. Americans shouldn't be paying substantially more than patients in other countries for the medicines they need to survive." Please consider visiting https:// actionnetwork.org/letters/tell-your-member-takeaction-to-lower-drug-prices today to send a note to vour representative and ask them to support H.R. 3 and vote yes to lower the prescription drug prices for all.
